EDITORIAL

This issue of Spiritual Moments is being released on January 24th, on the Feast of St. Francis de Sales. We have been doing this for many years. This date was chosen because St. Francis de Sales is the patron of journalists and also because it is on this day that Wellspring, Fransalian Spirituality Center, was founded twenty seven years ago. Pope Pius XI officially declared St. Francis de Sales as the patron saint of writers and journalists in 1923 because he was a pioneer journalist. He effectively used written pamphlets and other materials to spread the Catholic faith and convert Calvinists in his region. He was trying to reach a wider audience through written word than those listening to a sermon. He widely distributed pamphlets to spread his message which was a novel approach in his day. Within a year of his ministry, a series of some 85 pamphlets were posted by the front doors of homes and distributed in public areas explaining important truths about the Catholic faith. Saint Francis de Sales wrote more than 20,000 letters during his lifetime and published two books – *Introduction to the Devout Life* and *Treatise on the Love of God*. This new approach allowed him to reach a large number of people beyond just those who could attend sermons. I see in this novel idea the precursor to modern journalism. His approach was gentle, kind and deeply respectful. He did not preach down to people as it often happens in sermons but encouraged dialogue.

Following the example of this great saint, we are attempting to bring you articles, reflections, inspiration and thoughts on the virtues, especially the little virtues that he speaks much about. I hope the articles and thoughts in this issue of Spiritual Moments will bless you with good, sound and simple insights on the virtue of purposefulness, Wellspring's virtue of the year. According to St. Francis de Sales, purposefulness is aligning our actions with God's will in the present moment. He stresses the need for making firm resolutions to live according to God's plan and purpose and gradually, gently and patiently working towards spiritual progress, with abiding confidence in God's grace. He encourages staying focused on what is best in the present moment to fulfill God's will rather than becoming anxious about perfection. He advises us to take small steps in striving to fulfill what God calls us to fulfill. He reminds us that it is important to recognize our imperfections and short falls and not become anxious about being perfect. I hope that the articles in this issue of Spiritual Moments will encourage you to take those small steps and strive toward fulfilling God's will and purpose for you.

PURPOSEFULNESS

Recently, one of the gentlemen that I have known for many years said to me, "I want you to give me your pastoral counsel. What is my purpose? What must I do? I am eighty four years old, have Parkinson's disease, am unable to get around and have other ailments. Now, what is my purpose? I can't find a purpose for my life." I told him the following story of Moses, Aaron and Hur in prayer on top of the hill.

Moses, Aaron and Hur went to the top of the hill and prayed while the Israelites fought the Amalekites. As long as Moses held up his hands, the Israelites were winning, but whenever he lowered his hands, the Amalekites started winning. When Moses' hands grew weary, they took a stone and put it under him, and he sat on it, while Aaron and Hur held up his hands, one on one side, and the other on the other side, so his hands were steady until the going down of the sun. And Joshua defeated Amalek and his people with the sword. (Exodus 17:11-13)

The gentleman said, "Now I know what I must do." He found a new purpose, a new meaning and a new direction for life. His life no longer felt empty. Over fifty-five years of ministry, I have had similar dialogues with men and women in old age homes, retirement facilities, rehab centers and other similar situations. "What is my purpose?" is a question that people ask at different periods in their lives, especially during difficult and conflicting situations.

Most often, the question about purpose seems to be a situational one. Purpose is often seen as something to do, some task to accomplish, or some goal to achieve. Real purpose is far beyond doing things and achieving goals – beyond goals and objectives and beyond measurable results. If "purpose" meant just doing or achieving or accomplishing something, when we are not able to "do or accomplish" something, we wouldn't have a purpose and life would become meaningless.


Our purpose is to be what God made us to be and to do all we do to fulfill that purpose. We are born with purpose; we live with purpose and we die with purpose. The whole universe was created, ordered and held together with a God-ordained purpose. To be human is to be born with a purpose. God has a unique purpose for each one of us. We have a "God-ordained purpose" and we must participate in the fulfillment of that purpose. Our God-ordained purpose is not an individual or specific goal to be achieved within a given period of time but the fulfillment and fullness of our nature.

God has not only created us with a purpose but also endowed us with a direction and the power to fulfill that purpose. Everything in creation has an inherent propensity and the power which is God-given for fulfilling their purpose.

Our purpose is to be and to become what God made us to be...to be his image, to image him where He has placed us. We are created, ordained, baptized and anointed as sons of God to image God. We are created and ordained to participate in God's creative, redeeming and sustaining activity where we are placed in the universe.

Social sciences see our purpose as self-actualization, self-realization, the final goal, goal of personal fulfillment, or the goal of perfection. The followers of Jesus see their purpose as holiness, perfection, fullness of life with God, eternal life, fullness of joy in heaven, perfect, complete and joyful communion with God. Jesus said that He came to bring us fullness of life, fullness of joy and he prayed for our communion with him and the Father. (Gospel of John)





Be Still and Know that I am God

Psalm 46:10

The spirituality of St. Francis de Sales is what we know today as "Salesian Spirituality." This article is the first in a series of articles on Salesian Spirituality that we intend to bring you in future issues. We begin with a brief introduction to St. Francis de Sales.

St. Francis De Sales was born on August 21, 1567 at Thonon, near Annecy in France. He graduated from the University of Padua with a doctorate in both civil law and church law. He was ordained a priest on December 18, 1593. He worked among the Calvinists, faced much opposition, including attempts on his life and converted the whole district of Chablais to the Catholic faith.

He was ordained a bishop on December 8, 1602. He was a good shepherd, caring for all with a special love for the poor. He founded a contemplative religious order, "The Sisters of the Visitation" on June 6, 1610. This order was to accept as members the poor, the weak in health, the handicapped and the widows whom ordinarily religious orders did not admit.

Within a year of his ministry, a series of some 85 pamphlets were posted by the front doors of homes and distributed in public areas, explaining important truths about the Catholic faith. He wrote more than 20,000 letters during his lifetime. He wrote two books, Spiritual Classics, *The Introduction to Devout Life* and *Treatise on The Love of God*. He died at the age of 55 on December 28, 1622. He was canonized a saint by Pope Alexander VII on April 19, 1665 and declared a doctor of the Church by Pope Pius IX on November 16, 1877.

St. Francis de Sales is foremost among those who were consistently and visibly human in his relationship to God and people. His spirituality was so human that those without theological insights could understand and follow his spirituality. He radiated divine light through humanness like his master, Jesus. He was very human and gentle, optimistic and positive about life and the world, strong in character and compassionate in ministry and, most of all, he had a harmonious and peaceful spirit.

St. Francis de Sales is not merely a doctor of the Church, but also a director of souls. He teaches and inspires. He aims at making even the most abstract ideas clear and attractive; he is out to capture the hearts of his readers, not simply their minds. To this end he introduces examples drawn from every possible source: the Scriptures, Fathers of the Church, theologians, councils, liturgy, Mystics, lives of Saints, pagan classical authors, and the world of nature. Emphasis is laid upon keeping God continually before our eyes and doing everything for God, because God loves us and we love Him.


"Go courageously to do whatever you are called to do." This reflects the attitude with which St. Francis de Sales lived and guided his life. He encouraged people to find holiness in every day matters, emphasizing the freedom each one has to choose to be good and to do good, to live noble and virtuous lives and reject what is bad and harmful. In whatever state of life men and women find themselves, they can discover the way to God, joyfully and without fear. God can be found anywhere, everywhere and by everyone. The hours we spend in our daily chores need not be spiritually empty or useless. It is in the daily chores that we live out our life of faith.

Introduction to Devout Life—St. Francis De Sales

SEARCHING FOR PURPOSE



There is an old legend about a little fish who overheard fishermen say that a fish needs water to live. The little fish became worried and started hunting for water. He swam from creek to river to the seven seas. Finally, he met a big, old fish who saw how worried the little fish was and asked what the trouble was. The little fish explained that he was looking for water because he heard the fishermen say that a fish cannot live without water. The big fish laughed and said, "O little fish, why are you worried? Don't you know that you are in the water all the time?"

Don't you know...? God is in you and you are in God all the time and His purpose for you is within you all the time as well. You may or may not be conscious of it. It is his purpose that you must strive to fulfill all the time. You are born with His purpose; you live with His purpose and you die with His purpose.

An ancient Hindu scripture says, "I am the Spirit seated deep in every creature's heart; From Me they come; by Me they live; at My word they depart." (Bhagavat Gita). Elizabeth Barrett Browning, in her poem, "For Those Who See" says, "Earth's crammed with heaven and every common bush a fire with God."

The book of Exodus tells us that while Moses was tending sheep and goats, he heard God's voice come from a burning bush. God asked Moses to take off his shoes because the ground was holy. (Exodus 2) Since God is present moment by moment, we could walk barefoot all day. God speaks through the real world. He is in our struggles, our failures and our successes. Don't limit God. Take off your shoes and make the leap of faith; give God your best and strive to fulfill the purpose He has for you. St. Makarios reminds us, "The heart is a small vessel, but all things are contained in it. God is there; the angels are there, and there is also life and the Kingdom, the heavenly cities and the treasures of Grace."

Jesus prayed, "...that they may all be one, as you, Father, are in me and I in you, that they also may be in us, that the world may believe that you sent me. And I have given them the glory you gave me, so that they may be one, as we are one, I in them and you in me, that they may be brought to perfection as one, that the world may know that you sent me, and that you loved them even as you loved me. (John 17:21-23)

It is time for those among us, who have been baptized, have known Jesus and been to church for many years, to wake up and realize who we are, whose we are, where we are and whose purpose we are trying to fulfill. We need to awaken to the fact that we have been baptized in Christ and proclaimed true children of God. As children of God, we belong to God; we live in God and God lives in us. We have our God-given purpose, and that is what we must strive to fulfill. St. Paul tells us that it is "in him that we live and move and have our being." (Acts 17:28) and that "I live, no longer I, but Christ, my Lord, lives in me." (Galatians 2:20)

God is transcendent and yet an ever present mystery - not mysterious, not unintelligible, not beyond experience, not invisible - but profound reality, profound truth which we understand and yet is beyond our understanding. God, the "beyond that is within" is here and yet beyond.

Where can I go from your spirit?
From your presence, where can I flee?
If I ascend to the heavens, you are there;
if I lie down in Sheol, there you are.

Psalm 139:7-9

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There once was a little boy who wanted to meet God. He knew it was long trip to where God lived, so he packed his suitcase with Twinkies and a six-pack of root beer and started his journey. When he had gone about three blocks, he met an old woman. She was sitting in the park just staring at some pigeons. The boy sat down next to her and opened his suitcase. He was about to take a drink from his root beer when he noticed that the old lady looked hungry, so he offered her a Twinkie. She gratefully accepted it and smiled at him. Her smile was so pretty that the boy wanted to see it again, so he offered her a root beer. She took the root beer and once again smiled at him. The boy was delighted!

They sat there all afternoon eating and smiling, but they never said a word. As it grew dark, the boy realized how tired he was and he got up to leave, but before he had gone more than a few steps, he turned around, ran back to the old woman and gave her a hug. She gave him her biggest smile ever. When the boy opened the door to his own house a short time later, his mother was surprised by the look of joy on his face. She asked him, "What did you do today that made you so happy?" He replied, "I had lunch with God." But before his mother could respond, he added, "You know what? She's got the most beautiful smile I've ever seen!"

Meanwhile, the old woman, also radiant with joy, returned to her home. Her son was stunned by the look of peace on her face and he asked, "Mother, what did you do today that made you so happy?" She replied, "I ate Twinkies in the park with God." But before her son could respond, she added, "You know, he's much younger than I expected."

Young and old found their God in each other. God is there "behind and before, you encircle me and rest your hand upon me. Such knowledge is too wonderful for me, far too lofty for me to reach." (Psalm 139:5-6) God is around, above and below and deep within you. Keep searching. You will find him and live in him just as he lives in you. When you have found him within you, you have found your purpose. Go fulfill your purpose.

LIVE JESUS

I recently watched a short video about Sir Nicholas Winton. During World War II, he saved 669 Jewish children from Nazi-occupied Czechoslovakia, by arranging their safe passage by train to Britain. Appalled by what he saw, and aware that an effort was underway to organize a mass evacuation of Jewish children from Austria and Germany to England, Winton moved quickly to replicate a similar rescue effort.

For fifty years, he kept this extraordinary story hidden. In 1988, his wife stumbled across an old scrapbook stuffed with letters, pictures and travel documents. Despite Winton's initial reluctance to discuss his rescue operation, his wife encouraged him to turn the scrapbook over to a Holocaust historian. While reluctant to tell of his efforts, Winton welcomed the chance to meet with many of those he had saved. There are around 6,000 people in the world today who owe their lives to Nicholas Winton. They are the descendants of the group of refugee children rescued by him. Some of them know of his existence and the part he played in their history, many others do not. It was a short time in his life but a critical one for those whose lives were saved. He was only 29 years old at the time and for him that intervention was over in a flash. Only much later did this episode re-emerge in his life and he came to know the effect of his actions on so many others.

Sir Nicholas Winton's motto, "If something is not impossible, then there must be a way to do it" led him to follow his own convictions and undertake an operation others had dismissed as unnecessary or too difficult. Winton went on to live a remarkable life and passed away at the age of 106 leaving behind a legacy of courage, humility and love.

Everyone has a story and Sir Nicholas Winton has a remarkable one. What will the story of my life be?

Fr. Gus is a Fransalian priest. "Live Jesus" is the motto of the Fransalian priests. We are all familiar with the popular expressions, "What would Jesus do?" and "Be the hands and feet of Jesus." I hope that my life story will be that I tried to "Live Jesus" each day.

In *Inspired Common Sense*, a short booklet that contains brief reflections on seven fundamental themes of Salesian spirituality, we are reminded of St. Francis de Sales' encouragement to begin each day with a morning offering to direct our life and all our actions to God. I try to do that each morning and live my life with purpose each day, but it can be difficult to keep the busyness of life with all its responsibilities and expectations from getting in the way.

I believe we all share the same purpose to live Jesus and bring Jesus to the world, but God gives us each a unique purpose. I look forward to studying "purposefulness" this year and pray that the Lord will reveal my unique purpose to me and help me grow in living that unique purpose, being open to the opportunities that the Lord sends each day to "Live Jesus."
